Study Series: A Man After God's Own Heart Part 3: David and Jonathan Scripture:1 Samuel 18:1–4; 20:1–42 Teacher: Pastor Hephzibah Akintobi

Key Theme: Covenant friendship; God's provision of relationships in times of trial.

I. Definitions

Friendship: A deep, mutual relationship rooted in love, trust, and shared purpose. The bond between David and Jonathan shows that friendship is more than companionship—it's a soul connection 1 Samuel 18:1.

Loyalty: Faithful commitment to someone through good times and bad. Jonathan remained loyal to David even when it cost him his comfort and his position as heir to the throne.

II. What is Covenant Friendship?

Covenant friendship is a deep, spiritual and emotional relationship rooted in loyalty, love, and commitment. This friendship is not casual., not rooted in personal ambition, (not based only on affection)—they are forged through mutual trust, selflessness, purpose and shared faith in God. They mirror the biblical idea of covenant: a sacred, binding agreement, often sealed with sacrifice or symbol. *1 Samuel 18:3, 1 Samuel 20:1, 13-17, 42*

Jonathan, son of Saul, formed a deep bond with David, which was sealed with a covenant. He gave David his robe, armor, sword, and belt—symbols of trust, inheritance, and honor.

III. God's Provision Of Friendship in Times of Trial.

Covenant friendships often arise or are tested in *seasons of adversity*, where God provides strength and protection through another person.

Key Insight: One of God's greatest provisions to David was Jonathan, Saul's own son. This friendship wasn't superficial; it was deep, sacrificial, and ordained by God. Jonathan even gave David his robe, armor, and weapons—symbols of kingship and favor.

1 Samuel 20:1–42 – Jonathan risks his life to protect David from Saul's anger. Despite knowing that David would eventually be king instead of him. Jonathan chooses loyalty to God's plan and David's life over his own status.

Proverbs 17:17 "A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a time of adversity." **Ecclesiastes 4:9-10** "Two are better than one... If either of them falls down, one can help the other up."

IV. Identifying Covenant Friendship

A, Good Covenant friendships are marked by:

- a. **Christ-Centered Foundation:** The relationship is built on shared faith, love for God, and commitment to His will. Amos 3:3, Ecclesiastes 4:12 **Spiritual connection** "Knit souls" (1 Sam. 18:1)
- b. **Mutual Love, Sacrifice and honor** friends are, willing to sacrifice for your good. Jonathan gave David his royal garments (v. 4) John 15:13,
- c. **Loyalty and truth** Friends protect each other's purpose, speak the truth in love, celebrate others calling, with no competition, Hebrews 10:24, 1 Sam. 20:32, Romans 10:12 Ephesians 4:15.

d. **Mutual trust and confidentiality** – They shared secrets and are vulnerable.1 Sam. 20:16-17) **Romans 12:10 KJV** "Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one

B. Marks of Wrong/ bad covenant friendship

- **a. Control and Manipulation:** One person dominates the other emotionally, spiritually, or mentally. Fear, quilt or flattery is used to maintain the relationship.
- **b.** Unhealthy Soul Ties Deep: emotional entanglement beyond healthy boundaries, inability to function or make decisions apart from the other person.
- c. Distraction from God's Purpose: The relationship diverts you from your calling, prayer life, or obedience to God.
- **d. Jealousy and Competition:** Constant comparison, rivalry, or subtle sabotage. Praise is rare, but criticism is frequent.

V. Benefits of good Covenant Friendship

- 1. **Spiritual encouragement** Encourage one another and build each other up. They help walk in God's plan.1 Samuel 23:16, 1Thess.5:11
- 2. **Emotional support** Especially in lonely or dangerous seasons. *Ecclesiastes 4:9–10*.
- 3. **Divine protection** God uses people to shield and guide us.
- 4. **Confirmation of purpose** Jonathan affirmed David's kingship 1 Sam. 23:17
- 5. **Accountability and Growth.** Godly friends challenge us to grow deeper in faith, speak truth, and live with integrity—like David did even under pressure. *Proverbs* 27:17
- 6. **Shared Joy and Burdens.** Godly friends rejoice with us when we win, and walk with us when we are weary. The friendship supports God's calling on each other's lives.

Question 2: Have you ever "taken the bullet" for any friend? Romans 5:7-8 Share

VI. Jesus: Our Ultimate Covenant Friend.

Jonathan's covenant with David foreshadows Jesus' covenant with us. Jesus loves us sacrificially and remains loyal through every trial.

Scriptures: *John 15:13-15* – "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends... I have called you friends." *Hebrews 13:5*, *Isaiah 41:10* – "

Just like Jonathan stripped himself of royal garments to honor David, Jesus stripped Himself of divine privilege to clothe us in righteousness. *Philippians 2:6-8; Isaiah 61:10*
